Short and Long Term Objectives

In accordance with the Constitution of the Inner North Foundation, the principal object for which the company is established is to act as trustee for a trust for public charitable purposes supporting eligible charities that benefit the Inner North Community of metropolitan Melbourne.

In accordance with the Foundation's strategic plan adopted by the Board on 21 June 2011 this objective is to be achieved by:

- 1) Conducting an effective annual grants program
- Growing the corpus by 30% over the 3 year (including the contribution from IntoWork Australia)
- Becoming an increasingly effective participant and advocate in community philanthropy and workforce participation; and
- 4) Strengthening governance and organisational capacity.

Principal Activities

The principal activities of the Inner North Community Foundation Limited during the financial year were to provide funding support to enable transition to employment outcomes for disadvantaged residents in the local region, through the Pathways to Employment Grants Round.

Performance Measurement

The Inner North Community Foundation measures performance by the number and quality of applications to the Pathways to Employment Grants Round, and the number and value of donations received.

Class of Members

- (a) Only the following people are eligible for membership of the Company:
 - (i) up to four people nominated by the Founder;
 - (ii) one person nominated by a majority of directors who lives in or, in the reasonable opinion of a majority of directors, has a strong association with the City of Yarra municipal area;
 - (iii) one person nominated by a majority of directors who lives in or, in the reasonable opinion of a majority of directors, has a strong association with the Moreland City Council municipal area;
 - (iv) one person nominated by a majority of directors who lives in or, in the reasonable opinion of a majority of directors, has a strong association with the Darebin City Council municipal area; and
 - (v) up to two people who, in the reasonable opinion of a majority of directors, have appropriate expertise in any one or more of the fields of education, employment, training or finance or such other field as a majority of directors think fit.

Liability of Members

According to the Constitution of the Inner North Community Foundation Ltd, every Member undertakes to contribute an amount not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50) to the property of the Company in the event of it being wound up while he or she is a Member or within one year afterwards for:

- a) payment of the debts and liabilities of the Company contracted before the time when he or she ceased to be a Member
- b) the costs, charges and expenses of winding up; and
- c) for an adjustment of the rights of contributories among themselves.

Operating Results

The Inner North Community Foundation received donations and other income from investments totalling \$950,832 (2014: \$970,215); incurred expenses totalling \$556,569 (2014: \$445,945); and recognised an increase in unrealised fair value of investment of \$179,411 (2014: \$327,830) for the year.

Grant-Making 2014-2015

The Inner North Community Foundation is an independent grant-making foundation that funds projects to assist Melbourne's inner northern communities of Darebin, Moreland and Yarra. This covers the Melbourne area north of the Yarra and takes in suburbs such as Brunswick, Richmond, Reservoir, Coburg, Northcote, Preston, Fitzroy, Pascoe Vale, Glenroy and Collingwood.

The Inner North Community Foundation was established in 2007, has full tax deductibility status and is governed by a skills-based board of people who share a strong affinity for the local region. The Inner North Community Foundation's grant making is primarily geared towards local projects that provide new opportunities for disadvantaged people to gain work, or education and training that will help them to gain work.

Pathways to Employment Grants 2014-2015

The Pathways to Employment fund disburses grants annually towards projects that assist local residents in Darebin, Moreland and Yarra to get a job or to increase their employment prospects. In 2014 the Pathways to Employment grants distributed a total of \$307,500 towards 18 projects that focus on a diverse range of employment barriers faced by people locally, such as English language confidence and competence, mental illness, disrupted schooling or involvement in the criminal justice system.

Summary of Projects Funded in 2014 - 2015 through Pathways to Employment Grants

Australian Red Cross Society \$12,500

Wheel Power: Bicycle Mechanic and Refurbishment Program for Asylum Seekers
Hands-on mechanic training for asylum seeker volunteers. The program gives volunteers
experience in an Australian workplace, a forum in which to practice their English language skills and
an opportunity to increase their social and employment networks. The volunteer mechanics in turn
refurbish and recycle donated bicycles which are provided to asylum seekers free of charge.
Bicycle ownership delivers asylum seekers independence and mobility, allowing them to travel
across Melbourne to meet appointments, attend work or connect socially.

Fresh Start Employment Program

Young Pacific Island and Maori people are over represented in the Youth Justice sector (15-20%) of all Youth Justice referrals in Hume/Moreland region are Maori & Pacific Islanders). This program is for 16-25 year olds of Pacific Island and Maori descent and who are disengaged (or disengaging) from education and/or unemployed. The aim is to equip participants with tools and skills to enhance employment opportunities and empower participants towards positive social behaviour within their communities. The program also will provide an opportunity for the participants' families to be involved in their educational / employment journey.

Newly arrived migrants from Russia include Russian Brides and overseas students (with permission to work), spouses, family reunion, and skilled migrants. They do not know the Australian system and work culture. Russian brides are especially disadvantaged because they are not shown how to navigate the community services maze, to find organisations that might be able to help them with advice, information and referral. Newly-arrived migrants lack the self-esteem to be able to just ask for help; they often lack the skills of navigating the job-search system. Other barriers include significant differences in the education systems between the two countries. This program will assist in helping them to find work.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 June 2015

Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) General Information and statement of compliance

The financial report includes the financial statements and notes of Inner North Community Foundation Limited (The "Company").

The Company has elected to adopt the Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements (established by AASB 1053 Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 2010-2 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements).

These financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012. Inner North Community Foundation Limited is a not-for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial statements for year ended 30 June 2015 were approved and authorised for issue by the board of Directors on 29 October 2015.

(b) Investments

(i) Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets comprise investments in managed investment schemes. They are included in current assets unless management intends to dispose of the investment within 12 months of the reporting date.

(ii) Recognition and de-recognition

Acquisitions and disposals of investments are recognised on trade date being the date the Foundation commits to purchase or sell the asset. Available-for-sale financial assets are initially recognised at fair value plus transaction costs and are subsequently measured at fair value.

(iii) Unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of long term investments

Unrealised gains are recognised in equity in the available-for-sale financial assets reserve. When securities classified as available-for-sale are sold or impaired, the accumulated fair value adjustments recognised in equity are included in profit or loss. Impairment losses recognised in profit or loss on equity instruments classified as available-for-sale are not reversed through profit or loss.

(iv) Fair Value

The fair values of quoted investments are based on current published bid prices at the reporting date.

(v) Impairment

At each reporting date, the Foundation assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset is impaired. In the case of equity securities classified as available-for-sale, a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of a security below its cost is considered an indication that a security could potentially be impaired.



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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 June 2015

Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies (cont'd)

(b) Investments (cont'd)

If any such evidence exists, the cumulative loss – measured as the difference between the acquisition cost and the current market value, less any impairment loss on that financial asset previously recognised in profit or loss – is removed from equity and recognised in the income statement. Impairment losses recognised in profit or loss are not reversed through the income statement.

(c) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

(d) Employee Benefits

Contributions are made by the Foundation to employee superannuation funds and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(e) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been recognised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(f) Revenue

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Other revenue is recognised when the right to receive the income has been established.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(g) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, Expenses and Assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense.

Cash flows are presented in the Cash Flow Statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(h) Reserves

Other components of equity include Available For Sale financial assets reserves. This comprises gains and losses relating to these types of financial instruments.

Retained earnings include all current and prior Year retained profits.

(i) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The preparation of financial statements requires the directors to make judgments and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

Estimates and assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the Year in which the estimate is revised and in any future Years affected.

Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies (cont'd)

(i) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments (continued)

- (i) Critical judgments in applying the accounting policies Available-for-sale financial assets
 - The Foundation follows the guidance of AASB 139: Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement in classifying investments in managed investments schemes as available-for-sale financial assets.
- (ii) Critical judgments in applying the accounting policies Impairment of available-for-sale financial assets

The Foundation follows the guidance of AASB 139 in determining when an available-for-sale financial asset is impaired. This determination is based on the market value of the shares. Furthermore, the directors evaluate, among other things, the duration and extent to which the market value of the investment is more or less than its cost and the financial health of, and near term business outlook for, the investment.

Apart from those listed above, there were no other critical accounting estimates or judgments made in the preparation of the financial statements.
