Grants program purpose

Women in North Richmond (WINR), is a named fund of the Inner North Community Foundation. WINR supports local women, including girls, young women and nonbinary people, to connect through social, cultural, educational, and financial opportunities that enable them to thrive in the community of North Richmond. The Grants program will offer grants of up to \$500 to eligible organisations.

Target audiences for funding

Grants of up to \$500 are available to organisations supporting girls, women and non-binary people aged between 15 -25 residing or otherwise directly connected to North Richmond.

Applications are accepted by case workers on behalf of prospective beneficiaries that aim to connect them to social, cultural and educational endeavours.

Eligibility for funding

Single year funding applicants must be organisations that:

- Non-profit organisations registed with the Australian Charities and Not for Profits Commision that also are endorsed DGR1 entities by the Australian Tax Office.
- Applications are submitted by a caseworker for women and everyone who identifies as a girl, woman or nonbinary person aged 15 – 25.
- Beneficiaries are connected to North Richmond. This could be as a resident, student, someone who frequently
 visits or participates in a program in the area. i.e., Richmond Youth Hub or North Richmond Richmond
 Community Health Centre.
- Applicant organisations are encouraged to de-identify beneficiary details in the application if appropriate.

What will not be funded

Generally speaking, funding is not available for:

- Beneficiaries that are not directly linked to North Richmond.
- Individuals, 'for profit' organisations, sports clubs, government bodies, political parties or their candidates
- Funding for projects that have already been completed





How to apply

We encourage interested organisations to discuss their project ideas with Bianca Maciel Pizzorno, Grants Manager on 0478 174 116 before applying to ensure eligibility. Follow these three steps to apply:
