Short- and Long-Term Objectives

In accordance with the Constitution of the Foundation, the principal object for which the company is established is to act as trustee for a trust for public charitable purposes supporting eligible charities that benefit the inner north community of metropolitan Melbourne.

The strategy session held in February 2024 affirmed the longer-term strategic objectives for the Foundation:

Impact Evaluation: the wholistic and efficient means of mapping and evaluating the Foundation's theory of change, and the impact both its grants and activities are having within the inner north.

Operational Model – examining the necessary building blocks to reach the Foundation's aim of \$20million in funds under management by the end of 2027. This included different forms of additional resourcing, marketing, and the transition to new technology solutions to increase efficiency for grantmaking, fund management and donor communications.

Flagship Funds: call for public applications for the following grants programs:

- Pathways to Employment Grants Fund that supports projects that remove the barriers local people face on their journey to work.
- The successful launch of multiple Bakers Dozen Social Justice Fund grant rounds and supporting Merribek City Council with their Community Grants program.

Operations – embedding a volunteer engagement program to support the growth of the Foundation, and improving internal standard business practices.

Principal Activities

The principal activities of the Foundation during the financial year were to provide funding support to enable prosperous, connected and cohesive communities in the inner north, particularly through the Pathways to Employment Grants Round and growing support for charitable activity in Darebin, Merri-bek and Yarra.

Performance Measurement

The Foundation measures performance in part by the number and quality of applications to its grants programs, and the number and value of donations received.

Class of Members

Only the following people are eligible for membership of the Company:

- (i) one individual nominated by IntoWork;
- (ii) one individual nominated by the City of Yarra;
- (iii) one individual nominated by the Merri-bek City Council.
- (iv) one individual nominated by the Darebin City Council.
- (v) one individual nominated by a majority of directors who has a strong association with the City of Yarra municipal area;
- (vi) one individual nominated by a majority of directors who has a strong association with the Merri-bek City Council municipal area;
- (vii) one individual nominated by a majority of directors who has a strong association with the Darebin City Council municipal area; and
- (viii) up to three other individuals who, in the reasonable opinion of a majority of directors, have appropriate expertise to assist the company to fulfil its purpose.

Liability of Members

According to the Constitution of the Foundation, every Member undertakes to contribute an amount not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50) to the property of the Company in the event of it being wound up while he or she is a Member or within one year afterwards for:

- a) payment of the debts and liabilities of the Company contracted before the time when he or she ceased to be a Member
- b) the costs, charges, and expenses of winding up; and
- c) for an adjustment of the rights of contributories among themselves.

Operating Results

The Foundation received donations and other income from investments totalling \$838,118 (2023: \$845,363); incurred expenses totalling \$825,640 (2023: \$912,434) and recognised an unrealised fair value of investment of \$991,305 unrealised gain (2023: \$703,634 unrealised gain) for the year.

Review of Operations Grant-Making 2023-2024

The Foundation is an independent grant-making foundation that funds projects to assist Melbourne's inner north communities of Darebin, Merri-bek and Yarra. This covers the Melbourne area north of the Yarra and takes in suburbs such as Brunswick, Richmond, Reservoir, Coburg, Northcote, Preston, Fitzroy, Pascoe Vale, Glenroy, and Collingwood.

The Foundation was established in 2007, has tax deductibility status and is governed by a skills-based board of people who share a strong affinity for the local region. The Inner North Community Foundation's grant making is primarily geared towards local projects that provide opportunities that strengthen prosperous, connected, and cohesive communities in Melbourne's inner north.

The Charitable Fund (ABN 12 901 071 775) is required to disburse grants to charitable organisations as defined by the ATO. The Public Fund (ABN 33 542 897 543) is a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) endorsed Public Ancillary Fund. The Public Ancillary Fund has been operated in compliance with the requirements of the Public Ancillary Fund Guidelines 2012 throughout the year ended 30 June 2024.

Pathways to Employment Fund Grants program 2023-2024

The Pathways to Employment Fund disburses grants annually towards projects that assist local residents in Darebin, Merri-bek and Yarra to get a job or to increase their employment prospects. In 2022/2023 the Pathways to Employment grants distributed a total of \$200,000 towards 10 projects that focus on a diverse range of employment barriers faced by people locally.

The Pathways to Employment Grants are supported by IntoWork Australia (INGT Ltd), in partnership with the Cities of Darebin, Merri-bek and Yarra.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2024

NOTE 1: BASIS OF PREPARATION

General information

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012* and Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures, Interpretations and other applicable authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board. This includes compliance with the recognition and measurement requirements of all Australian Accounting Standards, Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the disclosure requirements of AASB 1060 *General Purpose Financial Statements - Simplified Disclosures for For-Profit and Not-for-Profit Tier 2 Entities*.

The financial report covers Inner North Community Foundation Limited as an individual entity. Inner North Community Foundation Limited is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Inner North Community Foundation Limited is a not-for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial report was approved by the directors as at the date of the director's report.

Historical Cost Convention

The financial report has been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by revaluations to fair value for certain classes of assets and liabilities as described in the accounting policies.

Going Concern

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which contemplates continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied in the preparation and presentation of the financial report.

(a) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the company is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(b) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits, short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2024

NOTE 1: BASIS OF PREPARATION (CONTINUED)

(c) Revenue

Donations and sponsorships are recognised as revenue when received.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which, for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(d) Financial instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the company commits itself to either the purchase or sale of the asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified as fair value through profit or loss, in which case transaction costs are immediately recognised as expenses in profit or loss.

Classification of financial assets

Financial assets recognised by the company are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, subject to their classification and whether the company irrevocably designates the financial asset on initial recognition at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVtOCI) in accordance with the relevant criteria in AASB 9.

Financial assets not irrevocably designated on initial recognition at FVtOCI are classified as subsequently measured at amortised cost, FVtOCI or fair value through profit or loss (FVtPL) on the basis of both:

- (a) the company's business model for managing the financial assets; and
- (b) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

NOTE 1: BASIS OF PREPARATION (CONTINUED)

(e) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term employee benefit obligations

Liabilities arising in respect of wages and salaries, annual leave and other employee benefits (other than termination benefits) expected to be settled wholly before twelve months after the end of the reporting period are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts based on remuneration rates which are expected to be paid when the liability is settled. The expected cost of short-term employee benefits in the form of compensated absences such as annual leave is recognised in the provision for employee benefits. All other short-term employee benefit obligations are presented as payables in the statement of financial position.

(ii) Long-term employee benefit obligations

The provision for other long-term employee benefits, including obligations for long service leave and annual leave, which are not expected to be settled wholly before twelve months after the end of the reporting period, are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflow to be made in respect of the services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations of service and employee turnover, and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that are denominated in the currency in which the benefits will be paid. Any remeasurements for changes in assumptions of obligations for other long-term employee benefits are recognised in profit or loss in the periods in which the change occurs.

Other long-term employee benefit obligations are presented as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the company does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, regardless of when the actual settlement is expected to occur. All other long-term employee benefit obligations are presented as non-current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

(f) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and purchased assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(g) Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified and repositioned for consistency with current year disclosures.
